Dear Colleagues:

I'm impressed by how often I hear people say, "I love this place." I hear it casually: students talking to one another in the hallways, from faculty and staff around campus, and from graduates at alumni events.

I'd never given the sentiment much thought until I decided to respond to someone the other day by saying, "What is it that you love?" The person's answer didn't surprise me. She said, "Well, the people for one thing. The students are never dull and everyone's so nice."

I think, however accidentally, that people who stay at Purchase do so because the work feels important and worthwhile, which, in turn, even during difficult times, buoys the collective optimism. In short, loving the place is to love what we all do.

I think retention is one way we see our optimism play out and affect students. And the signs on this front are encouraging. Our first-to-second-semester retention is currently near our all-time high of 94%. Here some other worthy notes on retention:

- Retention of our BA/BS students increased from 93.1% in the 2015 cohort to 94.2% in the 2016 cohort.
- Retention of our undeclared students rose from 89.1% to 92.9%.
- Retention of our low-income students in the 2016 cohort was at 94.3%.
- Retention of our first-generation students was higher, at 95.5%.
- Retention of our 58 students in the pilot group of Success Fellows was 100%.

These numbers represent a lot of hard work by everyone across campus. So, thank you so much.

But to return to the love of this place: it's something we should never take for granted. It reminds me that it's the people who make the place, and it's the people who make our mission and values live. Ultimately, our shared purpose lives in us, is expressed by us, and is validated when we hear people say they "love this place."

Strategic Plan Update: This section will be a regular feature of *Notes* going forward. To date, the work on the new strategic plan has included an evaluation of the previous plan and ongoing work by centers of strategic activity (e.g., strategic enrollment planning, completed program opportunities analyses, campus forums dealing with subjects of strategic importance, work with the BPC and SPC, etc.). Our next steps will include:

- asking everyone to respond to strategic inquiry questions; and
- creating a SharePoint site that will contain suggested readings.

These steps will help gather input to shape and focus the next strategic plan. A draft document will be ready for feedback and response by the fall semester.

Sleep: The Pattern of Life

Although humans spend one third of their lives sleeping, few people understand what is happening when we sleep and the benefits of good sleep habits. This talk will describe sleep (something that sleep scientists are very good at) and will delve into the possible functions of sleep (something that sleep scientists are still trying to figure out). Good sleep habits are equally important for long-term good health as good exercise and eating habits; however, many people in our society continue to view sleep as something they can give up at least temporarily. We pay a clear price for bad sleep habits and chronic sleep loss. This talk will cover the negative effects of regular sleep loss and poor sleep habits and will offer ideas for how to improve sleep.
