# Dear Colleagues:

I want to congratulate everyone on our recent recognition. President Schwarz announced earlier this month that Purchase College received the State University of New York's Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Shared Governance for this academic year. Again, congratulations to everyone on this wonderful award.

Speaking of governance: it's thorny business, especially lately. It seems that politicians in Congress and state houses are happier when defined by who and what they are against, rather than by who and what they are for.

As a public college concerned with public life, how might we shape the institution's response to the current divisive and belittling hyper-partisanship?

My own answer is to say we should keep doing what we do. Our community habitually promotes thoughtful inquiry and inclusive engagement across campus activities. You can see it in what faculty and students do; in how our community reacts during times of crises; in the programs we select and produce; and in our attempts to redress our missteps and shortcomings.

But could we make these activities, and the knowledge they create, more salient features of our education?

As a community of citizen artists, scholars, and researchers, we are active on a lot of fronts devoted to advocacy, engagement, and social change. Here are examples that immediately come to mind:

- One of our music faculty members, Du Yun, has just been honored with the 2017 Pulitzer Prize in Music for her opera *Angel's Bone*, a "harrowing allegory for human trafficking in the modern world." Reached at a cultural summit in Abu Dhabi, she observed, "I'll still be me who is very plugged into social change. That's the biggest impetus of why I want to write music."
- Our PSGA took up the cause last year against Corcraft's use of prison labor for its manufacturing.
- We have faculty and students involved each summer in ongoing efforts to preserve neighborhoods in Detroit.
- Our faculty, students, and staff are active environmentalists in the cause of sustainability (e.g., "The Rocket" composter, solar paneling, etc.).
- Our Multicultural Center sponsors a range of programs that promote diversity and inclusion.
- Students, in collaboration with faculty, conduct research in the Long Island Sound, New York City, Port Chester, and Yonkers, and as far away as Costa Rica and India.

This list is but a small sampling of efforts, and I am sure there are many that go unnoticed.

If we commingled all these efforts, incubated and supported their growth, and fostered new innovations, imagine the effects? Such a step could expand efforts to research community-based engagement and its impact on public dialogue, as a vehicle for building common understanding, increasing cooperation, or expanding

knowledge. This kind of initiative could also elevate Purchase's reputation for fostering critical and open dialogue that promotes an inclusive and robust public life.

Is it time to give these efforts a "home" on the campus? This place (e.g., a room, a "center," a location within the library, etc.) could build on our cross-disciplinary knowledge, which often results in projects that promote social change and inspire community engagement in a range of practices. Ultimately, such a place—thinking really big—could expand the influence of Purchase College, its faculty, students, and staff.

**Strategic Plan Update:** The Budget Priorities Committee (BPC) is evaluating initiatives for the next two-year budget cycle, designed to correct for a \$3 million deficit. These initiatives, enabled by our overall financial strength, will inform larger strategic initiatives in the new plan. The initiatives currently being reviewed by BPC are not strategic plan initiatives, but are reflective of the kind of longer-range considerations that the new plan will need to formalize.
