Dear Colleagues:

A year ago—almost to the day—I announced that the evaluation of our 2010-2015 strategic plan was complete. You can still access the evaluation on the <u>Assessment</u> Collaborate space.

The evaluation of the plan is one of three documents that should shape the development of our new strategic plan. Two other documents should also figure prominently in our deliberations: the Periodic Review for Middle States (PRR), which was completed last year, and our SUNY Performance Improvement Plan (PIP). The PRR is available upon request. The college's Performance Improvement Plan—approved by SUNY well over a year ago—can be found at <u>SUNY Excels 2015 Performance Improvement Plan</u>.

I would offer just one word of caution, however: while the previous plan's evaluation, the PIP, and PRR should influence our deliberations, they should not deter us from reflecting on Purchase's unique mission and its relevance. In thinking about our mission, I'd like to return to an idea that I discussed in Notes in December 2015. I wrote then that I hoped as we developed our next strategic plan we could advance the connections between critical and creative inquiry as the defining characteristic of our liberal education. I believed then that these interconnections could empower students for success in an economy that will be complex, competitive, and frequently disrupted. I still believe in this idea today.

I went on to say that I believe Purchase is uniquely positioned to offer students an experience that is expansively democratic, personally liberating, and globally relevant. I was attempting in 2015 to outline an overarching philosophy that might ground our strategic planning in core values. As a continuation of that effort, I hope you will join the conversations currently being sponsored by the Strategic Planning and Assessment Committee about Institutional Learning Outcomes (ILOs). The next forum (*The Alphabet Soup of ILOs, PLOs and SLOs: How does connecting the dots inform the next strategic plan?*) will be this Thursday, February 22, from 3:00-5:30, in the Library on the second floor.

Please take time to think about our future. In contemplating the prospect myself, I found Noam Chomsky to be helpful when he said, "Optimism is a strategy for making a better future. Because unless you believe that the future can be better, you are unlikely to step up and take responsibility for making it so." And I would add that it falls to us to encourage this responsibility—the one to make the future better—in our students and ourselves. My hope is that our new plan can present a recipe for continually regenerating our collective and shared optimism. With a shared hopefulness, we can learn together how to shape a public space that is democratic, just, and inclusive.

It will be the first ever to be set to Tony Bennett's music, it will be developed right here on campus, and it will premiere here on May 5.
