Dear Colleagues:

What follows is a letter we sent to Chancellor Johnson today:

Dear Dr. Johnson:

As you are aware through recent news reporting, there are riots in Haiti causing shortages of food, medicine, and other crucial life supporting supplies. In calls for Haitian President Jovenel Moise to resign over soaring inflation and allegations of corruption, for over a week protesters in Port-au-Prince and elsewhere in Haiti have set cars ablaze and clashed with police. Just last night, 110 tourists were rescued from Haiti and flown home, and the U.S. State Department has asked all American non-emergency personnel and their families to evacuate.

Grisly details paint a dire situation: among many examples is the nearly empty intensive care unit at the State University Hospital of Haiti, the largest health care facility in the capital city of Port-au-Prince. Many patients have died or fled for care elsewhere. There is no food there, no medicine, no water. According to CNN reporting, there are only two hospital employees remaining in the ICU.

Closer to home, and for those of us here at Purchase, descriptions of desperate conditions come to us from our former students and colleagues with whom we are in touch. They ask us for assistance in whatever form we can provide. We feel compelled to do all we can, and this letter to you grows out of our deep urge to help.

As you did so boldly during the crisis in Puerto Rico after the hurricane, we seek your leadership to galvanize our efforts across SUNY. We are writing to ask that you issue a call for support for efforts to bring calm to Haiti, urge SUNY campuses to reach out through well established channels to donate whatever support is possible, and to utilize our system-wide campus partnerships in Haiti to support our colleagues and friends.

For our part, here at Purchase, we are in touch with Haitian students who were part of our transnational film program this past June. In addition, we are seeking advice from FOKAL, our Open Society Foundations in Port-au-Prince, and our partner in Jacmel, The Artists Institute, on how we can directly assist.

As you are aware, SUNY is involved with the Kellogg Foundation, and others in Haiti, on a large sustainable village (SVLC) project. The Kellogg—SUNY SVLC Project at Arcahaie has many local partners with whom SUNY is in regular contact. We believe they would welcome our support at this time of unrest.

Dr. Johnson, your leadership has brought a great deal of sensitivity to a range of important issues. We, the undersigned here, ask for your continued advocacy for a country whose "acute on chronic" condition, as Paul Farmer described in his book, Haiti: After the Earthquake, will compound the devastation of recent events for months and years to come.
