Dear Colleagues:

Most obviously, of course, welcome back from what I hope was a wonderful winter break. I look forward to seeing all of you as we begin the spring semester.

In these *Notes*, I would like to provide an update on the college's Performance Improvement Plan (PIP). As you know, we submitted our plan at the end of October 2015 as required. On December 9, 2015, we received an email from the SUNY administration asking our campus to consider revisions in the areas of enrollment, retention, graduation, completions, and default rates. Peggy De Cooke, Betsy Robertson, and I, with the approval of President Schwarz, drafted a response, which was sent to <u>Elizabeth Bringsjord</u>, SUNY's vice chancellor and vice provost for academic affairs. The final paragraph, included here, sums up the lengthier letter:

Dear Dr. Bringsjord:

In summary, in response to your questions:

- the first-year retention rate has been increased (from 82% to a best in sector rate of 90%);
- our graduation rate remains the proposed improved rate (to one point above the sector rate of 65%);
- our current enrollment targets reflect responsible leadership in face of historical trends; and, finally
- we agree that a lowered default rate to 5% in light of the recent data you provided makes more sense.

Influencing our response, as I'm sure you understand, is our commitment to shared campus governance. The timeline for submission of the PIP did not afford us the opportunity for campus discussions. Subsequent to its submission, however, we have held discussions with campus constituencies and developed goodwill around these improvement metrics. To now radically change or alter the PIP, without appropriate shared consultation, would undo efforts to galvanize the campus to improve performance.

On December 22, President Schwarz received a letter from <u>Alexander Cartwright</u>, SUNY's provost and executive vice chancellor, notifying him that our plan was approved. I won't include the entire letter here, but the following excerpt sums up Provost Cartwright's response:

On behalf of Chancellor Zimpher, I am pleased to inform you that—consistent with the requirements of the 2015–16 budget legislation—your SUNY Excels Performance Improvement Plan has been approved.

I want to recognize the thoughtful work that went into the development of your campus plan, and especially want to thank you for your efforts to ensure that its preparation was collaborative and that the strategic priorities and goals identified are consistent with our commitment to continuous improvement under SUNY Excels.

The Improvement Plan will be important as we move forward to create a new campus strategic plan. It's also important to recognize that the chancellor's approval of the plan is a good first step in that process, as we continue to strengthen efforts to grow our student success initiatives.

2016–17 Junior Faculty Development Leave Awards

I am pleased to announce 10 recipients of the <u>Junior Faculty Development Leave Awards</u> for **2016–17**. Awardees are offered a semester's leave at full salary, during which they are released from all teaching and service obligations to the college. These awards are, in effect, internal fellowships that provide an opportunity for junior, untenured faculty to concentrate exclusively on advancing or completing an important professional or scholarly project.
