Dear Colleagues:

Like so many documents of its kind, I'll bet your copy of our current <u>strategic plan</u> is dog-eared, highlighted, and filled with comments in the tattered margins. Well, laugh if you like, but mine is actually in that condition. As we begin the final year of our plan, I'd like to share some general thoughts about the opportunities that lie within reach of our next plan.

The challenges we face, clearly articulated in our current plan, will continue to require collaborative, campus-wide decision-making and assessment. We cannot maintain our measures of quality, address inadequate state support and competition for a shrinking number of students, and find varied revenue streams without a set of coordinated strategies. These circumstances clearly support the recommendation of an institutional effectiveness committee in the current governance proposal.

The current strategic plan, in my judgment, has forged linkages across the college and between systems that better operationalize institutional effectiveness. Admittedly, we have more to do to fully assess and improve that effectiveness, and many of the current strategic goals will form the basis for continued effort and assessment.

Given that we are better prepared to think strategically, however, what should the next strategic plan articulate? Should it continue to refine the current priorities and renew the institution's commitment on these same fronts? Or is it an opportunity to focus on our mission and give it greater expression for the 21st century?

In response to these questions, I would urge us to define in the next plan a catalyst that will promote cross-campus discourse and elevate the distinctiveness of the college. Rather than a plan with a large number of goals and objectives, I'd ask that we consider a plan that allows a unified effort with a singular focus—not to homogenize the schools or conservatories, but, rather, to strengthen a force within the college that will:

Direct our efforts to more fully realize the vision of Purchase College as a place recognized for shaping public discourse, because the pairing of conservatory programs with programs in the liberal arts is an irreplaceable catalyst for public engagement.

Central to our vision is a call to address how the pairing creates a distinct campus culture and education and to answer the central question: Why does it matter? By answering this question, we could:

- Stimulate strategic activity that invites creative innovation;
- **Grow** the diversity of the college community;
- Continue our efforts to inspire respect for diversity and difference across the campus;
- Propel the college forward as a leader in sustainable and green technologies;
- Strengthen shared governance; and, finally,
- Ignite a campus effort to celebrate why we matter to our students, each other, and the broader world.

These characteristics, for me, provide the essential ingredients of a plan that brings to life the "unique education that combines programs in the liberal arts with conservatory programs in the arts." By suggesting a narrower focus, however, I know we cannot ignore the ongoing priorities that need redress. To think strategically in pursuit of our best interests, however, should ignite our collective imagination and set in motion actions that sharpen the college's distinct character.

Update on Student Engagement Grants

The Academic Resource Center will be continuing its Student Engagement Grant program this spring. This grant program has funded numerous cross-disciplinary events and allowed faculty to foster learning experiences for their students outside the classroom. Highlights from the **fall 2014 awards cycle** include:

- Charlotte Glynn took her Film Workshop students to the Performing Arts Center to see the Czech Philharmonic. The goal of this event was to strengthen this community of students by attending a cultural event outside the classroom and to support course objectives by experiencing the work of other artists.
- Amy Beth Schneider hosted another successful event, "Primary Sources: A College Writing
 Coffeehouse." Funds were used to purchase beverages and snacks for students in her College Writing
 section. These students shared excerpts from their personal or analytical essays, which were inspired by
 the theme of risk—personal, creative, artistic, or analytical. Some students shared their work aloud,
 while others displayed visual art or self-produced films.
- **Joe McKay** received a grant to take students in his Introduction to Physical Computing course to the Maker Faire New York. The "Maker" community is a group of tinkerers, artists, and activists who share their gadgets and inventions at this extraordinary event. Students were encouraged to think creatively about technology and mingle with the exhibitors.

Purchase Awarded \$210,000 for ASD Support Services

The <u>FAR Fund</u> in New York City has renewed its support of our autism spectrum disorders (ASD) program, which provides support services for Purchase students who are on the autism spectrum. The **three-year renewal grant** totals **\$210,000** (\$70,000 per year). Congratulations to the principal investigator, **Lauren Greiner**, the staff psychologist in the Counseling Center's supported education program, and to **Ed Herran** in the Office of Sponsored Funds!

The ASD program assists students in navigating the complex academic, social, and independent-living challenges that arise in college. Services include individual counseling/coaching, a weekly social skills support group, peer mentoring by juniors and seniors, and social events. Over the next three years, the program will focus more on career development, and on staff and faculty education. With its renewal, the grant now incorporates funding for new programming, including a career preparation workshop, a summer orientation, and a conference featuring a speaker who will address the specialized needs of college students with autism.
