Dear Colleagues;

In all its diverse manifestations, no matter the context, before it has ended the pandemic will have caused a scale of heartbreak that only an unknowable interval of time and unchecked amounts of reflection will be able to discover. Such exhumation will require, most importantly, that artists, scholars, and researchers carefully unearth—as only they can—the pandemic's visible effects and hidden experiences within the interiority of human existence.

Undoubtedly, helping our students will be our focus in these endeavors. Consider for a moment that many suggest that today's college students will spend a good portion of their adult lives overcoming the setbacks caused by the pandemic. We fear this prospect instinctively at Purchase because we know how many students struggle to make ends meet, while also striving to complete their degrees. From weekend jobs to difficult commutes to loan debt—we see it all. But we know that by helping them to overleap these setbacks and recover, that we can reacquire our equilibrium as a community.

Comprehending the dizzying scale of the pandemic will be difficult for us. It will be some time before we collectively grasp its full impact. Much like a climate event—a hurricane, tornado, or flood—you have to climb to a great height to see and realize the full picture of destruction. In human terms, though, we will especially need time to reflect. And I think therein lies the importance of our physical return to campus: the need for time and space to reflect in the presence of each other, to be heard as well as feel we are being heard.

Simply, our campus will be for everyone—students, faculty, and staff—the very space needed for talking, thinking, and writing about the time we will have just lived through. And it can provide the setting for processing all the narratives of the pandemic, which will, in turn, revive the life and purpose of our campus. Once it is safe to return, our very congregating will reawaken in us our reason for being on this campus, in the presence of each other. It will also enable us to celebrate our resiliency during the pandemic.

I trust that place and purpose are intertwined and inseparable. Our campus is home to a community in dialogue. And it's this very dialogue that brings about the creation of knowledge—be it in the form of a sculpture, play, or research paper. The work we do, especially the work with students, is intimately tied to their sense of our campus as the location for that work and where it must be processed and reconsidered. For all of us, if not at Purchase, then where?

It is especially timely given the Middle States self-study and our work on the strategic plan to renew our understanding of we do that makes Purchase. Purchase. We will realize that we are more than a loose assortment of functions digitally bound in remote and transactional delivery. Instead, we will deepen our understanding of our community as one dedicated to the pursuit of knowledge and insight, the character of which is distinct and transformational. For this reason, and many more, I look forward to our community's return to campus and being together to reawaken our sense of purpose in this place.
