Dear Colleagues:

Just because you can't touch an event the day after doesn't mean it didn't happen. So here's a mini "year in review" in case you need help believing it happened.

One of my personal favorites of 2015–16 has to be the first meeting of our new College Senate. Our faculty presiding officer, **Dan Hanessian**, has ably led the implementation of our shared governance model. Dan's effort, and those of all the committee chairs and senators, has brought about a smooth and well-organized transition to our new governance structure.

And speaking of stand-out leadership efforts: This year marks the end of an era of really fine leadership provided by **Greg Taylor**, who has guided the theatre arts conservatory for eight years with inclusive and caring stewardship. Thank you, Greg!

And, now, to return to the beginning: The academic year started off for our new students with the first-ever **First-Year Convocation**, complemented by a film presentation of Spike Lee's *Do the Right Thing*. As a follow-up to the film, three weeks of the First-Year Seminar were devoted to topics surrounding diversity, including identity, microaggressions, and privilege, in workshops developed and conducted by Diversity Fellow <u>Shaka</u> <u>McGlotten</u>.

The **Durst Humanities Building** reopened (some might say it's still reopening), and it's great to have it back and filled with students and faculty. Thanks to **Ross Daly, Peter Sprague,** and **Sean Connelly** and the whole Capital Facilities group for the effort in getting the building opened.

In 2015–16, we have seen several efforts to launch new programs and reinvigorate others. Here are a few that come to mind:

- A cadre of faculty members, led by **Genevieve Hyacinthe**, spearheaded the effort to update and reinstate the <u>minor in global black studies</u>. In response to a call for proposals in connection with the minor, four projects for 2016–17 have been funded.
- A new campus program, **One Night**, was launched. The program, which is a joint effort between Academic Affairs and the Office of Community Engagement (OCE), uses a play script of the same name, written by **Dean Bell**, to help students more deeply understand the dynamics of sexual assault.
- The proposed new MFA in Media Art and Culture has undergone two external reviews.
- The Learning Center piloted an **internship program** that allows for more robust training and encourages applicants from a wider range of majors and with a greater diversity of backgrounds.
- The Office of Community Engagement opened our new **Multicultural Center** in January, which will expand the educational and social diversity/cultural programming for the campus.

• This past spring, the OCE also expanded our **gender-neutral housing accommodations**. In the fall, returning residents may live with any gender in any of our eight residential buildings.

There were several programs that were especially important this year, and here are a few that stand out:

- On February 24, the campus celebrated Black History Month with the powerful Lift Every Voice, a wonderful evening of presentations, remarks from the stage, performances, and a photo exhibit in the upper lobby of the Performing Arts Center. It was a proud moment for our community because it was conceived and created by a diverse company of people from across campus. In all, someone from each school contributed to the production.
- <u>Ruth Wilson Gilmore</u>, the inaugural Eugene Grant Distinguished Scholar, organized four events and worked with eight social justice fellows from disciplines across the college. Her work culminated with an <u>Earth Day Symposium</u> at the Neuberger Museum, focused on water and the social justice issues related to its use and management.
- <u>Liza Lou: Color Field and Solid Grey</u> opened in November. Liza Lou challenges traditional definitions of painting, sculpture, and craft in her dazzling installations made entirely of glass beads. *Color Field*, the artist's largest sculpture to date, is an abstract work measuring approximately 1,400 square feet that carpeted nearly the entire floor of the Neuberger Museum of Art's largest gallery in a shimmering field of color.
- In February, the Performing Arts Center launched the *Purchase Film Series*, curated by faculty in the School of Film and Media Studies, to bring the best in contemporary filmmaking to the PAC. This initial installment, *Documentary Now!*, featured three films with guest speakers: <u>Ivory Tower</u>, <u>The Iron</u> <u>Ministry</u>, and <u>Free Angela and All Political Prisoners</u>.

Plans for the PAC's 2016–17 season are well underway with a vision that begins to shift toward incubation of new works and longer-term artists' residencies. Highlights include commission projects with Kronos Quartet and Shen Wei Dance Arts, and a special commission with **Doug Varone**, a member of our dance faculty. Varone's piece will feature 14 students in the Conservatory of Dance. We are especially pleased by the work of **Jon Faddis**, professor of jazz studies, who has curated an excellent jazz series for 2016–17.

Under the heading of "if you missed this event, you missed out," here are some big ones: <u>Blues for Mr. Charlie</u> by the Purchase Repertory Theatre; any of the Durst Lectures by **Manohla Dargis**; dance concerts, but especially the <u>spring concert</u>; the community event led by our students in November, <u>Purchase Stands with Mizzou</u>, to honor and support students protesting at the University of Missouri; <u>The House of the Spirits</u>, a theatre and performance production; the <u>MFA exhibitions</u> in the Maass Gallery; the <u>new media senior exhibition</u> in the Passage Gallery; the launch of <u>Italics Mine</u>; the 35th annual <u>Student Research Symposium</u>; and last, but certainly not least, the student awards ceremony.

And now for a potpourri of items that come to mind:

- More than 30 students attended the annual SUNY-wide <u>undergraduate research conference</u> at SUNY Cobleskill, led by **Linda Bastone**.
- Thanks to the hard work of **Chris Kaczmarek**, **Steven Lam**, **Brooke Singer**, **Ed Herran**, and **Christopher Robbins**, and with great leadership by **Ravi Rajan** and **Betsy Robertson**, we successfully opened our community-based engagement lab (<u>PC4</u>) in Yonkers.
- The **Library** and its staff continue to serve our students and community in remarkable ways, from ongoing programs to special efforts like the program for Black History Month and the Faculty Achievement Recognition event.
- The response by **Campus Technology Services** (CTS) to a computer virus outbreak in the Humanities Building was so swift that it was contained and eliminated with little harm done.

• Our **athletics program** continues to produce experiences that reinforce the importance of performance on the field as a support for performance in the classroom, ending the year with two Chancellor's Award recipients.

And, now ... let's celebrate our success at Commencement!

Thanks to the generosity of Peter and Bette Fishbein, this award now provides \$5,000 to cover costs necessary for undertaking a scholarly research endeavor in one of the liberal arts disciplines. The 2016–18 recipient is **Meagan Curtis,** assistant professor of psychology. The funding will enable her to further examine the efficacy of the perceptual training program she has developed to improve pitch perception and, consequently, the ability to identify emotion in speech. Some of the funding will support her training in the use of newly acquired EEG equipment.
