## **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

Designed for all levels, beginning through advanced, this course uses the Purchase campus and environment as it's subject. Students work with a variety of drawing materials, developing their abilities to observe and interpret "landscape". The class meets in the studio for the first session and during inclement weather. Students are responsible for providing their own transportation to off-campus sites.

This course explores Nature as a source for discovery, intellectual investigation and inspiration for making drawings. Students will work mainly from observation of nature, which will strengthen their drawing skills and will heighten each student's ability to see more vividly. Some areas of focus will be: Form, Space, Perspective, Zoom in/Texture, and a specific focus of your choosing. Please keep in mind that this syllabus is subject to change.

- Visual language skills
- Further knowledge of the fundamental principles of visual form, line, value, perspective and composition
- Technical drawing ability and hand eye coordination
- Critical thinking and problem solving skills
- Research skills including the ability to analyze and synthesize visual information
- Responsibility to others and our community
- Respect, tolerance and openness to new ideas and ways of thinking
- To think independently and creatively
- An understanding of historical knowledge and events in the field
- A critical analysis of different art forms
- Visual literacy and the power of images
- Their own vision and unique artistic vision

### 1. Attendance Policy / Participation

- Attendance and punctuality are expected for every class.

#### Crit Days:

Assignments (and studies) should be pinned up and ready for discussion at the beginning of class. If it is not, it will be considered late. Each week late counts for 25 points off the grade for that assignment. I expect a high level of effort for each assignment. It is important to sketch, make studies, tests before completing ambitious drawings. Homework should take 4-6 hours a week.

Work Days: We will meet promptly on time on work days where I will take attendance before leaving. We will be working indoors and outdoors so bring all weather appropriate clothing, sunscreen and bug spray as we will be facing the elements. These days I will be guiding projects and coming around to give each of you to give individual feedback with the project. Make sure you come to class prepared with all the materials listed below.
