Dear Colleagues:

What is often unclear for many colleges when dealing with sexual assault is a pathway forward that engages their educational missions. Too often, campus efforts rely solely on judicial action and campus safety measures as the avenues for addressing sexual assault. And I do not mean that by thinking educationally we excuse or ignore the actions of those who commit assaults. Consequences are integral to maintaining the security of the community and its confidence.

What does a sustained educational approach look like, though? At the heart of this effort is the goal of cultivating and fostering a commitment to respectful and civil engagement that strengthens the dignity of every human being. It is especially important to help students engage in and cultivate healthy relationships—intimate as well as casual—that respect the boundaries and dignity of each individual. And creating "teachable moments" will connect us to what we do best: educate. Specifically, I would ask each area to consider how its current programming might create new opportunities for a sustained dialogue that can help our students process ideas about boundaries and respectful interactions.

The following programs can also play a key role in developing students' commitment to our community values: orientation, first-year courses, community engagement, service learning, social action activities, and residence life programming. I believe a thorough review of these programs will reveal new opportunities for strengthening the education of our students.

Understanding the role that alcohol plays in campus assaults is also important to this effort. In many circumstances, alcohol is a planned part of the assault. With this in mind, it will be essential to redouble our efforts so our students know that alcohol and drug use can often intensify the risk to their friends and colleagues.

Purchase College is fortunate to have fine professionals who work directly to prevent assaults and serve students in need of assistance. Annually, we devote a great deal of energy to educating students about safety measures and who to contact for assistance. Each of us can play a role in this effort. Lincoln Brower to Speak on the "Grand Saga of the Monarch Butterfly"

This final lecture in the School of Natural and Social Sciences Fall 2014 Lecture Series begins at **7 p.m.** in the **Natural Sciences Lecture Hall:**

Tues., December 2: Lincoln P. Brower, PhD
 Research Professor of Biology, Sweet Briar College
 The Grand Saga of the Monarch Butterfly

Since 1977, Lincoln Brower has made more than 50 expeditions to the monarch butterflies' winter retreats in the high mountains of central Mexico. Many of the widely known facts about monarchs have emerged from his research on their chemical defense against predators and the ecological chemistry of their interactions with their milkweed host plants. During his first expedition, Professor Brower realized that the phenomenal migration and overwintering biology was threatened by logging in the winter roost areas, and he began conservation work with the World Wildlife Fund-Mexico (WWF-Mexico) and government agencies in Mexico, the U.S., and Canada that continues to the present day. In this lecture, illustrated with photographs ranging from electron micrographs to satellite images, Professor Brower will present a first-person account of his field expeditions and lab explorations, and describe the conservation issues that threaten the butterflies' unique migration and wintering biology. Professor Brower hopes that his audience will include curious naturalists and ardent conservationists of all ages and backgrounds.
