Dear Colleagues:

What's in a biography? At first, I imagine most of us think of it as an event-driven account of one's life told by someone else. Usually it starts with the circumstances of a person's birth and moves forward. It goes something like, "S/he was born here on this date, moved, or didn't move, to wherever and wound up doing this, that, and another thing."

Trust me, I know that this formula has none of the makings of a biography worth reading. My "take" on biography here is obviously for the sake of argument.

What I've been surprised by, though, is that, for many of our students, their autobiographies—the versions they recount themselves—are often presented as arguments for why they won't succeed.

Maybe there's a maturity required to see in one's life the makings of success. And, to that end, sometimes our students may not know themselves well enough to see their pasts as preludes to future successes. On this point, I am unsure.

What I do know is that sometimes students see their futures with an eye toward looming failure. Within their memories seem hardened images of disappointment. Of course, memory is a funny thing.

For my part, I wonder if they even realize their successes? Do past accomplishments feel gratifying? After all, this is the most over-tested generation in history. And with that condition there are consequences. One penalty may simply be a devaluing of the very academic success we want them to hold in high regard.

Regardless, I think it's worth considering how students see their futures. I worry that too often they can't imagine success. Wherever we can help them on this front is time well spent.
